

Membership Report

Since my last report we have 2 new members and another member that was a late renewal, so our membership now stands at 110.





Veterans or currently serving members residing in Ontario can fish without a licence, they simple show their ID Card (NDI 20) or their Record of Service Card (NDI 75) when asked by a Conservation Officer.

From Monday to Friday Veterans get in free (**DAY PASS ONLY**) into any Ontario Park. You still need to create a log in and book a time at the park of your choice, don't forget to select **VETERAN** during the process.

As of 1 January 2024, all veterans and currently serving members get free admission into Parks Canada. They ask that you show your CFONE Platinum Card, which indicates that you are a veteran or currently serving members. If someone is eligible and would like a card, you can register at CFONE.

If you are flying please remember that veterans and currently serving members can check baggage free of charge with Air Canada, WestJet and Porter. Simply indicate no checked baggage when you are booking and when you arrive at the airport show your Active or Veteran ID and the fees will be waived. You can check up to three (3) bags. **NOTE:** All checked bags have to be in the name of the Active or Veteran member. When my wife and I travelled in December with WestJet we saved \$160 in baggage fees.

As always, new members can join by filling out a membership application or by visiting the legion.ca. If they are joining online be sure to let them know to select Richmond & District #625.

Lexie's poster is now on display in the hall.






Ways & Means

For those of you who do not know, Ways & Means is the committee that helps to raise money for our Branch as a means to keep us profitable and open.

This used to be accomplished via dinners held in January, February March, April, the summer barbeques, catering done by the ladies and two core dinners that were held for members.

The income from hall rentals, bar sales, darts, euchre and thrice weekly coffee club also goes to pay the bills but were not considered part of Ways & Means.



This year we have been able to split the volunteers into 3 groups: making desserts on Thursday afternoons and doing the veggie prep Friday morning; setting up and serving on Friday afternoon then serving and clean up Friday evening. We also have 2 people on the door checking people in and collecting payment, 3 manning the barbeques, 2 to 3 doing the "running" (delivering the cooked entrees & keeping the cooks supplied) and 1 bartending.

The first barbeque saw 16 members, 4 students, 2 from the 33 Service Battalion and 1 non-member help out and the second barbeque had 14 members, 3 students, 2 from the 33 Service Battalion and 1 non-member help out.

I must not forget to add all the people from Friday afternoon Euchre who help set up the tables each week. Though it seems a little chaotic at 4pm with the whirlwind of activity getting everything set up, we are actually very well organized.

This year the price of beef has escalated but we have managed to keep ticket prices reasonable with just a \$2 increase for the steak platter and the burgers, dogs and chicken staying the same as last year (\$12, \$8 and \$16 respectively). The steaks are being purchased locally this year, from King's YIG and, though the first week the steaks had mixed reviews, the second week saw nothing but rave reviews.

Many hands go into making the barbeques a success from stocking the bar, to buying all the food and necessities, scheduling the helpers and all the work involved in setting up, serving and cleaning up. Things that might go unmentioned like setting up and cleaning the barbeques then putting them away, getting the needed supplies out to the barbeques and putting the tables and chairs away, do not go unnoticed.

So thanks to everyone who contributes to making everything go so well - I will name names at the season's end.

Just one request -if you have put your name forward to help, please let us know if you are not going to be there so we can make adjustments and not count on your presence.

There was 54 residents in attendance and Iain Clogg provided the music while Eileen Kavanagh, Pat McGrath and Elizabeth Douville were jointed by Emily Smith, from the 33 Service Battalion, and her partner to hand out the snacks & carry the drinks and have a visit!

Each night starts at 7 p.m and ends at 8 pm with the Legion volunteers being there by 6:30 and leaving by 8:30. When you add in the commute from Richmond that adds another 2 hours to the evening for the volunteers.

Thanks to all the volunteers for taking part in this and a big thank you to Pat McGrath for not only organizing it all, but doing the driving as well.

Because of the duration of the 2nd round, and not getting to play against everyone, they switched it up and we played 9 games of 301 which enabled us all to compete against each team.


81 games were played in total and Richmond came ahead winning by 17 games in total! There is a trophy that is being engraved for us!

Senior Living Session

On May 13, 2024 a lovely lady named Caroline Inman from Solva Senior Housing Consultants was at our Branch to provide information to us regarding decisions and options that will be part of our futures as we all age. It was very interesting.

Not to mention the influence emotions have on those rushed, last minute decisions.

At this stage in our lives we should have made wills, thought about end of life decisions as well as funeral arrangements and shared this information with those who should know.

As you might recall I wrote last year how the unexpected loss of my sister Gill 2 years ago nudged me to do the research, compare prices and finalize & prepay for my funeral. Prices and plans vary greatly and prepayment does not always mean prepaid in full - many local funeral homes have been bought out by large corporations and if the cost of your funeral is not covered by the prepaid amount, your estate will be charged the difference! News to me and to many others I am sure. The young lady at my choice made it clear that my arrangements are covered in full no future payment required! She also made the point, as mentioned above, that often when children are making emotional decisions for their parents arrangements, things end up more lavish and expensive than mom or dad would have ever wanted so preplanning is a must, even if you don't prepay. If you have any questions about this feel free to call me. Back to Solve!

The 3 options she talked about were:

- 1) **age in place** -stay in your home and have care and services come to you including meals, yard maintenance, self care assistance etc. There are many community services that can help you stay home including some services that are funded, subsidized or that you pay for in full.
- 2) retirement residence the services provided can vary from totally independent living to fully assisted retirement living which can be optional meals, housekeeping services to supported assisted living as needs arise.
- 3) **long term care -** offers higher levels of care based on physical and cognitive needs and is governed by the Provincial government meaning funding and fees are regulated. But wait lists are long.

We invite you to visit your local Legion Branch to obtain more information regarding this Remembrance program and more importantly, to submit a story and photo of a Veteran. Everyone is welcome to submit a story, including Veterans, relatives or friends.

Drop off or send your histories and stories to your local Legion Branch early. We accept them year-round. Please do not drop them off or mail them to our Provincial Command Office.

This project not only produces an annual Military Service Recognition Book, but also raises funds through a telephone appeal to the general public and through advertising sales.

The book publisher, Fenety Marketing, conducts a telephone appeal on our behalf to private citizens and the business community throughout Ontario.

Funds raised through the program are being utilized to support various Veterans Transition Programs that in turn will assist our Veterans who suffer from various challenges they face through their day to day lives.

We invite you to share your story or the story of a loved one through your local Legion Branch."

The MSRB raises money for the Legion – during year #11 a total of \$199,628.70 was received from the publisher, Fenety Marketing.

This brought the total funds that received to date for the first 11 years of our program to \$2,020,049.51. Expenses to date total \$761,134.39 and \$537,542.06 of this amount has been utilized to support 14 various Veteran Transition Programs. (by the way I have sent an email asking what the rest of the funds were used for. wr)
