





Approval for the donation to Veterans House Ottawa The Andy Carswell Building finally came through in August and a cheque was mailed out the very next day! Thanks to Kanata, Orleans, Montgomery Branches and our Branch, the entire "wish list" for the Andy Carswell Building was covered!



So the 2024 Poppy Campaign donated \$5000 to the Perley, \$5000 to the Andy Carswell Building and \$2000 to student bursaries. Four thousand was budgeted but we only had 2 applications.

A love letter to Canada from American Robert Arnold

There's a place where winter arrives like an uninvited house guest it stays long enough to put away the dishes. A place where people survive the wrath of nature with nothing but a good pair of boots & a shrug. A place where decency Is not dead. A place where a hand shake still means something, where national identity is stitched together not with arrogance or conquest but with quiet unflinching resolve. And that place dear friend is Canada.

If there is a refuge left in this world from the cruel absurdity of modern civilization it is there-tucked beneath the Northern lights wrapped in the hum of a snow plow at dawn and while other nations with their bellowing & bravado stagger through history in search of greatness, Canada has been quietly excellent all along, without the need for parades or messianic declarations of destiny. And it is a place built not on war but on negotiation, not on blind ideology but on the simple understanding that if you're going to survive in a land where winter tries to kill you every year you're going to have to get along with your neighbours.

So in 1867 in the most Canadian way possible she was officially born – not in the scream of musket fire, no divine proclamation no threat of annihilation, just a hand shake and a quiet understanding that they had something worth holding on to.

And Canada has this strange and radical idea that a country should take care of its citizens universal healthcare is not a debate but it's a given the idea that someone should go bankrupt because they had the audacity to get sick is as unthinkable as charging people for oxygen. And this is a country where workers still have rights — where the government does not actively wage war against unions. Where the minimum wage is not a cruel joke, it is a place that still understands the dignity of labour. It does not see the working class as an inconvenience but as the foundation upon which everything is built.

And Canada does not boast it does not beat its chest it does not need to because strength is not in the volume of one's voice but in the steadiness of one's character. Canada has weathered every storm, endured every hardship and not with bravado but with grit. It is a nation that sent soldiers to fight tyranny and not for Empire or glory but because it was the right thing to do.

It is a place where democracy is not just a performance but a practice. While American drowns In voter suppressions and pollical theatre, Canada quietly goes to the polls with the simple belief that voting should not be a battle but a right.

It is a country where people still say sorry when the bump into you. Where a stranger will help you push your car out of the snow before even asking your name. There is a humility there, a kindness that is not performative but instinctive.

It is a nation that understands that real strength is not in tearing others down but in lifting them up. And if there is a last bastion of decency a final whisper of what a nation can be when it is not consumed by greed and fear it is Canada. It is the soft glow of a of a hockey rink in the winter twilight, it is the laughter of friends over a Crown Royal. It is the unwavering belief that people deserve dignity that community matters, that kindness is not a weakness but the most powerful force of all.

And O Canada you beautiful stubborn snow-covered sanctuary of sanity may you never lose your way. May you never trade your quiet strength for the loud insanity of empire. And may you always be there just beyond the border, a reminder that a nation can be great without having to tell the world about it.
